What are the long term trends that make North Central aquaculture attractive?

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Aquaculture developed in the South mostly in response to low row crop prices and efforts to find alternative use for marginal farmland as the Midwest is experiencing today.

- 1. Aquaculture and corn and soybeans production provide synergistic advantages, i.e., aquaculture provides a ready, local market for corn and soybeans as low-cost commercial feed.
- 2. The Midwest has the demand base with proximity to large food markets including Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit, Indianapolis, Kansas City, Minneapolis/St. Paul, and St. Louis. About one-half of the U.S. population can be reached within a day's drive.
- 3. The U.S. has a deficit in seafood trade and projections are that global seafood demand will, at least, triple by 2025. Growth in aquaculture will help to meet the projected market growth.
- 4. Bait fish production from aquaculture is needed to meet the increasing demand from the recreational fishing/angling and tourism industries.

The aquaculture industry can grow in the North Central and Midwest region to supply the food and recreational needs in the region. Currently, over 90% of the needs are met with supply from outside the region.
