This fall we welcome a new faculty member, Dr. Levon Esters! Dr. Esters joined the Purdue Agricultural Education staff and the YDAE Department this August. He received his B.S. degree in Agricultural Business from Florida A&M following which he then moved north to North Carolina A&T State University for a M.S. degree in Agricultural Education. Another northward trip landed Dr. Esters at Penn State University for a Ph.D. in Agricultural and Extension Education. Between his B.S. and M.S. degrees Dr. Esters taught high school agricultural science and business and served as the coordinator for the Ag-Business Career Pathway at CHSAS (Chicago High School for Agricultural Sciences). For the June 30, 2009 Endowment report, the Endowment reflects the downturn in the stock and real estate markets as the value declined to \$126,000. Purdue University endowments did experience less of a decline than the overall markets. Hopefully, the latter part of 2009 has begun a new growth period.

Scholarships totaling \$22,000 were awarded for the 2009-10 school year for a total of greater than \$119,000 over the life of the Endowment.

2009 Distinguished Agricultural Alumni Award

Gregory Curlin, agricultural science and business teacher at Switzerland County High School, received the Distinguished Agricultural Alumni Award in March 2009. Curlin is the Region IV vice president of the National Association of Agricultural Educators and was the region's Teacher of the Year in 2005. He is a member of the board of directors of the National Young Farmer Educational Association.

He has done his job well in Vevay. After earning his bachelor's in agricultural education in 1990, he returned to his hometown to teach. Today, 132 of the high school's 482 students are in the agricultural program. Curlin also mentors the FFA chapter, which has grown from 18 to 106 members under his tenure and earned top awards.

The school recently built a new greenhouse and completed a fish lab facility, and this year it will pilot a new high school agriculture curriculum in partnership with National FFA.

"The diversity Purdue offered in agricultural education gave me a good idea of what to expect and what I could do in the classroom. Purdue prepared me for challenges. I like challenges, and I went after them."

2009 Agricultural Alumni Certificates of Distinction

The Ag Alumni Association presented its highest honor, the Certificate of Distinction, to agricultural leaders during the Ag Alumni Fish Fry at the Indianapolis State Fairgrounds on February 7, 2009. Among the honorees were the following Agricultural Education graduates.

Robert Brinson retired in 1998 as superintendent of the Clinton Central School Corporation, completing a 37-year career that included 12 years as a classroom teacher and 25 years as a school administrator. A native of Henry County, Brinson graduated from Purdue University in 1958 with a B.S. in Agricultural Education. He earned his M.S. in Education in 1965 and his Ed.S. in 1978, both from Purdue.

His classroom teaching career began at Fayette Central High School near Connersville. In 1961, he was hired as the vocational agriculture teacher at Clinton Central. He established a highly regarded agricultural education program for secondary students and adults alike. In 1980 he led a movement to expand the agricultural education facilities by adding a classroom, a shop, a new tool room, and additional storage and workroom areas. With his support, the department and the Clinton Central FFA Chapter continued to thrive, receiving additional state and national recognition, and the Young Farmer chapters grew to seven, serving 155 families.

With his wife, Brinson established two annual scholarships to support Purdue students in Agricultural Education. In retirement, he has remained active in community service activities.

Thomas Daugherty recently retired from Maconaquah High School where he served as the agricultural science and business teacher, a position he held for his entire 37 year career. He graduated from Purdue University in 1972 with a B.S. in Agricultural Education, and received his M.S., also in Agricultural Education, from Purdue in 1977. Daugherty also graduated from Class IV of the Indiana Agricultural Leadership Program.

In addition to his many teaching accomplishments, he has distinguished himself through scholarly activities in service to agriculture and natural resources education. Daugherty has written several curricula that are in use statewide, including the Indiana Advanced Life Sciences: Animals course. In 2002, he co-authored a textbook, *Managing Our Natural Resources*, that is now in its 4th edition and is used throughout the United States in secondary agricultural education.

In Miami County, Daugherty's service has left an indelible mark. As the recipient of the prestigious Christa McAuliffe Fellowship for Indiana in 1999, he used the fellowship award to establish Together Everyone Accomplishes More (T.E.A.M.) Miami County Youth Leadership Academy that focuses on atrisk youth and engages them in community service projects. Daugherty serves as the director/principal facilitator of the T.E.A.M. academy.

Robert Lyons retired in 2006 after a 46-year career teaching biology and vocational agriculture in Jay County, Indiana, first at Portland High School and later Jay County High School. He is now a full time farmer with 1400 acres in production. A native of Bryant in northern Jay County, Lyons graduated from Purdue University in 1960 with a B.S. in Agricultural Education. He received his M.S. in Agricultural Education from Purdue in 1967.

For several years Lyons was the most successful FFA fundraiser in the state. He worked with other school staff, FFA members and the agriculture advisory board to build a state of the art greenhouse for \$270,000, using no tax dollars. The greenhouse is widely believed to be the best high school greenhouse in the state.

Lyons was honored for his work with the Jay County Fair when he was inducted into the Indiana Association of County and District Fairs Hall of Fame in 1987. Governor Mitch Daniels named him a Sagamore of the Wabash in 2008.

Necrology Report

Over the past year we have lost several former agricultural science and business teachers. The following are those who have passed away this year. Please contact us if you know of others that have passed on this year.

Lewis H. Worman, 81, died Sunday, November 9, 2008. Mr. Worman moved from West Lafayette, IN to Albion in 1951. He retired from Central Noble School Corporation in Albion in 1989 where he had taught Vocational Agriculture since 1951. He was a World War II U.S. Army veteran.

G. Allen Ullom, 62, passed away Friday, March 13, 2009. He was a 1969 graduate of Purdue University. Mr. Ullom was a former agriculture teacher at Hagerstown High School and later raised hogs with his father on the family farm. He had served the last 20 plus years as a Purdue Cooperative Extension educator in Randolph, Perry, and Howard Counties.

Aaron W. Parks, 91, died Thursday, May 28, 2009. Mr. Parks was a retired agriculture teacher from Northeast Dubois and a World War II Army veteran.

James Lee Carr, 60, passed away Saturday, June 6, 2009. Mr. Carr received his Bachelor of Science in agriculture education and later earned a Master of Science in school administration. He taught school for two years at Clinton Prairie, and then taught school and later became assistant principal at Sheridan High School, where he served for 18 years. He then accepted the assistant principal's post at Hamilton Heights High School where he was currently working and had for 16 years.

William V. Davis, 76, died Saturday, July 11, 2009. He was a graduate of Purdue University and Indiana University. A dedicated teacher, Mr. Davis retired from 32 years of teaching agriculture and science in 1991. He taught at Ninevah High School, New Palestine High School, and Princeton High School. From 1978-1979 he served as president of the Indiana Association of Agricultural Educators. He was an FFA and 4-H leader for many years and touched the lives of many people.

Dr. William H. Hamilton, 89, passed away Sunday, August 9, 2009. He served in the Army Air Corps during World War II. He joined the Purdue University faculty as an assistant professor in fall 1967 in the Department of Education. Retiring in 1989 from Purdue University, Dr. Hamilton was awarded professor emeritus status in 1990. His preeminent work was the co-authored textbook *Agribusiness: An Entrepreneurial Approach* published in 1991. In addition, he authored or co-authored six other textbooks. He was chair for five Ph.D. dissertations including Dr. Allan Goecker Assistant Dean and Associate Director of Academic Programs, College of Agriculture, Purdue University. His primary role was in teaching and service to the Indiana Agricultural Education teachers. Dr. Hamilton taught undergraduate and graduate courses in Agricultural Teacher Education. He took graduate courses "on the road" across the state of Indiana to serve a need of teachers. A teaching expertise was in audio-visual equipment and teaching aids. During his 32 years at Purdue, he was university supervisor for 150 student teachers. He authored numerous bulletins and technical reports. His funded projects enhanced the curriculum for Indiana Agricultural Education especially in the area of agribusiness.

Gerald L. Runyon, 78, died Sunday, August 9, 2009. He served in the U.S. Army in Germany 1953-1955 and the U.S. Army Reserve 1955-1962. Mr. Runyon received a B.S. in education from Purdue University in 1953 and an M.S. in 1958. After the service he began teaching vocational agriculture and taught for over 35 years, the last 30 at Clay City High School. He was the FFA advisor at Clay City and continued to volunteer with the State FFA Foundation after retirement.
