- 2. Adopt 19 May 2020 agenda: Motion to approve agenda by Steve Yaninek as amended, second by Matt Kraushar. Motion carried.
- 3. Approval of February 18 2020 meeting minutes: Motion to approve minutes as amended by Matt Kraushar, second by Eric Fischer. Motion carried.
- 4. Old business:
  - Status of filling IISC member vacancies Mike Warner followed up with Michael Nossett, Deputy General Council, Governor's Office, confirmed reception of request, but no actions to report

#### 5. New business:

- Biennial conference status Dawn Slack
  - Conference had 300 registrants, but coronavirus forced the meeting to be postponed and rescheduled for August 20<sup>th</sup> 2020; all speakers on board with rescheduled meeting; had to pay half of cater's fee because of contract obligations
  - o Concerns about putting 300 people into a conference room given potential health concerns
  - o Elizabeth suggest spacing daylong conference out over several days
  - O Steve can presentations be recorded in a webinar format?
  - Elizabeth easy to capture presentations as webinars, she could add close-capping but would take time; also concerned about meeting liability
  - o Phil consider limiting number of people from same organizations
  - o Mike where you able to retain the sponsorships? Dawn year, so far
  - Doug continuing education credits possible? Elizabeth yes, we already do this with EAB University; Phil shared positive experience with being able to receive continuing education credits from webinars offered by Cornell University
  - Action Items: The Council encourages the Biennial meeting committee organizers to
    anticipate offering the rescheduled conference as a virtual meeting and consider in an person
    meeting only as a possible fall back position if the coronavirus situation changes
    dramatically.
- Invasive Species Field Guide status Dawn Slack
  - o Field guide is done. Plans to produce 550 copies on waterproof paper with two rings at \$10 each; production paid for off a grant
  - Doc off to printer this week thanks to payments from Indiana Native Plant Society (\$2000),
     TNC (\$1800) and IISC (\$1660)
    - Will still need assembly after production to punch holes and add rings
  - Shared layout in ppt presentation online.
  - o PDF of doc will be available from the Indiana Native Plant Society, SICM and IISC websites for wider circulation
- Senate Bill 99 status and preparation of presentations for the legislative study committee Mike Warner
  - SB 99 and about 50 others were not assigned to a legislative study committee for this summer
    - Dawn SB 99 committee will continue to meet and consider next steps; only two years left for III and 27 CISMAs that know exists
    - Mike sees a lot of traction around that state that was not there before; a carbon bill was
      assigned to a committee, still might be a place where invasive species concerns are
      expressed; Dawn TNC working on a couple of white papers regarding the impact of
      invasive species that she will share
    - John state budget looking at a revenue shortfall of about a billion dollars; the increase the legislature planned for the second year of the biennium expected to be flat at best, but more likely with new cuts; Purdue is preparing for 10% cut
- Invasive Plant Advisory Committee updates---Dawn Slack
  - O Looking for guidance from Council regarding the use of the federal definition of invasive species to avoid confusion with the public and maintain consistency within state agencies; problem includes social media postings by some state agencies; consulted with individuals from several state agencies and it was suggested she draft a letter to DNR requesting that the federal definition be used as the basis for the state definition going forward
  - o Elizabeth- what is definition?
    - Federal definition as per Executive Order 13112 (Section 1. Definitions) an "invasive species" is defined as a species that is:

- 1) non-native (or alien) to the ecosystem under consideration and
- 2) whose introduction causes or is likely to cause economic or environmental harm or harm to human health.
- Heather Invasive species impact the ecosystem services in urban as well as non-urban systems
- Steve do the state agencies use a definition that is different from the federal government definition?
- o Eric Division of Fish and Wildlife uses a definition that aligns with the federal definition, if not verbatim
- Megan Division of Entomology and Plant Pathology (social media?) website should be "fixed" and now is up to date
- Doug read definition now on their updated website which does align with the federal definition
  - Division of Fish and Wildlife coordinates with the DNR programs
  - Heather consider using microbes instead of diseases
- Working with Eric Imboden (Purdue webmaster) to update terrestrial plant lists to reflect new terrestrial plant rule on IISC website

### • Other New Business

- Economic analysis of plants in trade listed as highly invasive IPAC is working with DNR Division of Entomology and Plant Pathology and Megan on updated economic analysis
- Steve concerned about assuring that the IISC meetings be presented as "public meetings"
- Megan— new plant rule now in effect; inspectors have been out all spring and have been busy enforcing the new terrestrial rule which has required some operations to remove and destroy illegal plant material; now tracking plants in trade listed as highly invasive plants by IPAC to aid in economic impact analysis
- Heather noted that, on behalf of the Council, she had sent Kris Krouse a card and gift certificate to REI in appreciation for his service; she then shared a reply from Kris that thanked the Council for the experience and opportunity
- Managing invasive plants Dawn what should people do with invasive plants that people want to remove? Is there IDNR guidance? Don't put into mulch piles? Megan the new terrestrial plant rule gives the agency authority in exempting individuals on how best to remove and destroy invasive plant material; the agency is not issuing permits, but can provide an official letter authorizing method is needed
- 6. Next meeting date: July 21, 2020 (currently on TNC calendar); also note that fall meeting is scheduled for November 10, 2020.
