## Purdue Center for Commercial Ag Webinars on Land Leasing

## Looking for Common Ground in a Land Lease Contract

As time goes by, it is easy to lose track of the actual terms if an agreement is not in writing. A landowner and tenant often have different views. If additional terms are outlined in a lease contract, this can help derail a dispute between a tenant and a landlord.

Kris Kristofferson was a respected singer-songwriter, who wrote a short song about two truckdrivers, who both perceive that a waitress is completing an act of kindness for two children. She did not charge the youth the full amount for pieces of candy. In turn, the truckers

both decide to leave the waitress a large tip, and Kristofferson then sings, "Here comes that rainbow again."

It's a heartwarming song about everyday life. However, life is not always that simple. Someone else watching the waitress give away candy might see the act differently in that she should not be giving a break to anyone. Even close family members, who own farmland together, may have very different life perspectives.

AgLease101.org includes multi-state materials which help landowners and land operators discuss and resolve issues to avoid legal risk. The website also guides both landowners and land operators towards informed and equitable decisions.

Ag Lease 101 was created by a team of economists and attorneys. At this website, there is a document library in which each lease and supporting document was written, reviewed and edited by members of the North Central Farm Management Extension Committee. One of the documents, "Fixed and Flexible Cash Rent Lease Agreements For Your Farm," addresses possible additional terms to add to a farm lease agreement. As noted in the document, it is always best to consult with an attorney when listing additional terms.

At a minimum, basic terms including the names of the parties, a description of the property being rented, the beginning and ending dates, renewal and termination provisions, the amount of rent, and how and when rental payments are due. Both parties might want to add additional provisions such as:

**Yield data** - The tenant operator must share the data at a certain point in time, such as within 30 days of harvest

**Capital improvements** - A good example is subsurface drainage or fencing. The provision might state how the parties will pay for the improvement, whether either party will provide labor, maintenance and repair of the improvement, and recoupment provisions for the operator if there is an early termination of the lease

**Soil tests** - A farm lease typically requires a tenant operator to maintain soil health and fertility. An additional provision could help ensure soil health by establishing fertility benchmarks

**Conservation** - Practices such as planting cover crops, rotating crops, using no-till, or maintaining buffers. If requiring certain practices, the lease should state the agreed upon practices and address how to manage costs for the practices.

Finding a rainbow in your lease contract is not always possible, when a challenging situation comes along. There are steps that can be taken to help improve communication in advance by discussing terms that are of importance to both parties.

# Women in Ag 2024 Award Winners

The Purdue Women in Agriculture team celebrated some outstanding women at the Indiana State Fair's Celebration of Agriculture!

**Julia Wickard**, *Leadership Award Winner*, has extensive experience in agriculture and currently serves as the State Executive Director for the Indiana Farm Service Agency (FSA). She first assumed this role in 2009 under the Obama Administration, served until 2017, and returned in April 2022 under the Biden Administration.

In her position, Julia oversees FSA programs across all 92 Indiana counties, leading a team of over 325 employees and 300 county committee members. Her focus includes promoting programs in commodity, conservation, and disaster assistance to support Indiana agriculture's vital role in the economy.

Julia connects Indiana agriculture to the national landscape and advocates for farmers at local and national levels, helping to secure federal funding for the state.

In addition to her role at FSA, Julia and her family own Wickard Livestock. Since branching off from McClarnon Stock Farm in 1994, they raise registered Angus cattle and Boer goats in Greenfield, Indiana, reflecting their commitment to the agricultural business.

**Carla Yerkes**, *Achievement Award Winner*, and her family has been involved in Indiana agriculture for decades, both directly and indirectly. She fondly recalls conversations with her grandfather about agriculture during his childhood, reflecting on the technology available then compared to today. Currently, Carla is a highly recognized research scientist and Laureate at Corteva Agriscience, a company formed after the merger of Dow Chemical and DuPont. She has been with the company for over 28 years.

Corteva Agriscience, headquartered in Indianapolis, IN, is an agricultural technology company that employs over 21,000 people globally. It operates in more than 140 countries, with over 150 research and development sites and more than 90 production and manufacturing facilities. As a leader in seed and crop protection products, Corteva serves farmers worldwide.

Carla's contributions to the success of both the company and Indiana agriculture are evident in her work developing traits for corn and soybean seeds, as well as herbicides used for various crops and non-crop applications. Over the years, she has been an inventor on 63 U.S. patents, authored numerous internal research reports, published 16 peer-reviewed scientific journal articles and book chapters, and presented 38 abstracts at conferences.

**Shelby Whitaker**, *Emerging in Ag Award Winner*, grew up in rural Indiana and was introduced to agriculture in the second grade when a family friend suggested she join 4-H. This decision changed her life.

As a 10-year 4-H member, Shelby met many farmers and developed a passion for agriculture. She stated, "I experienced firsthand the dedication and love those farmers have for agriculture, which drives my own passion."

Her family started a rabbitry for competition and mentoring 4-H youth. Shelby participated in over 13 projects annually, held various leadership roles, and represented 4-H at multiple conferences.

In high school, she joined the newly established FFA program. Within a year, she competed on the Soils and Livestock Judging teams, winning both leadership development events for FFA District I and advancing to the state level.

Shelby is double majoring in Agricultural Sales and Marketing and Agricultural Communication at Purdue University. She's involved in several ag-related clubs and studied sustainable agriculture in Ireland during her sophomore year.

Shelby's work experience is closely linked to agriculture. After her freshman year, she interned with Bates Corporation, designing marketing campaigns and managing social media, leading to a 91.2% increase in sales. As a Communication Intern in the College of Agriculture, she created marketing materials and organized the Indiana Forestry & Woodland Owners Association website. Most recently, she served as a Sales and Marketing Intern for Bane-Welker Equipment, achieving a 1375% sales increase. This past summer, she will work as a Harvest Marketing Intern at CNH Industrial.

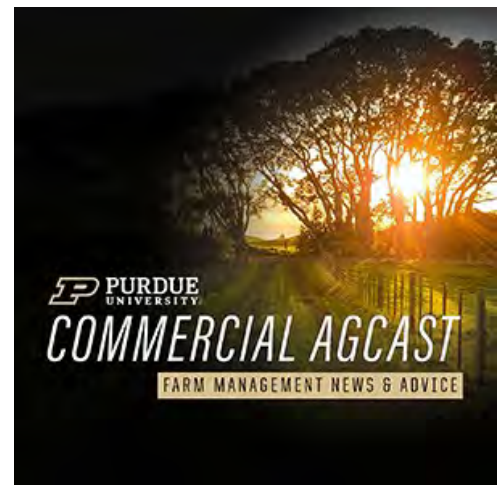
