Bug Bowl Insect Art Contest Rules:

- Drawings may not be larger than 14" X 17".
- Drawings must be on flat paper. No stretcher frames, mats, fabric, wood, or protruding parts more than 1/2 inch off the surface of the artwork.

We *love* the creativity shown in the wide variety of submitted artwork, but we can't hang it on our walls with the extra weight that mats and other materials add.

- Only one artwork submission per student.
- Artists must be attending a K-12 school or homeschooled in the state of Indiana.
- Insects or arthropods (spiders, millipedes, etc.) must be central to the artwork.
- Submissions must not contain any violent, graphic, or disturbing themes. The focus should be on showcasing the positive and captivating aspects of insects. Artworks with violent or inappropriate content will not be considered for the exhibition.
- Artwork must be original (not traced, not copyright-protected images).
- The artist's name, grade, teacher name, and school must appear on the front of each drawing. We have adhesive labels that we will send to you for free, or you can print your own:

- We accept art from homeschooled children. Parents must pre-register them; parent's name and city/state go on the ID card for the Teacher/School lines.

By following these requirements, we aim to create an inclusive and visually engaging insect-themed art show that celebrates the creativity of students while maintaining a positive and educational atmosphere.

Evaluation Rubric for Bug Bowl K-12 Art Contest

Visual impact and originality	Unique organization of art elements, content and execution create striking impact. "Wows" the viewer. Work holds the viewer's attention.	Art elements and content have little or no impact on the viewer. Art is traced or copied from an existing piece.
Interpretation and creativity within the theme of insects and arthropods	Design shows unique and creative interpretation of the theme. Effort beyond what was required.	Design shows unique understanding of the theme, and good creativity.	Design shows some creativity and follows the theme.	Insects are not the central to the design or artwork is inappropriate.
Degree of difficulty and effort (Adjusted for age of child)	Exceeds expectations for artist's age and ability Insects and other animals are accurately shown with correct anatomy.	Above average for artist's age and ability. Insects and other animals are accurately shown with (mostly) correct anatomy	Design appropriate for artist's age and ability. Note: This rubric will be adjusted as age appropriate; we don't expect a 1st grader to produce finely detailed line art 😊 It is okay if smaller children put "faces" on their insects; faces are developmentally important to kindergarten-3rd graders!
