2022 Public Policy Legislative Internship

Indiana Farm Bureau, Inc., Indiana's largest nonprofit farm organization, is seeking one public policy intern for the 2022 spring semester.

Indiana Farm Bureau, Inc. works to be an effective advocate for farmers and through its policies and programs, promote agriculture and improve the economic and social welfare of member families. Indiana Farm Bureau has over 256,000 members, representing nearly 70,000 farm families across Indiana.

The legislative policy intern will work with the Indiana Farm Bureau public policy team during the 2022 state session of the Indiana General Assembly and the weeks that encompass the spring 2022 semester at Purdue. The public policy team is responsible for advocacy, policy development and policy implementation, as well as identifying, monitoring and representing agricultural interests on emerging issues.

The internship is a full-time opportunity, working five days per week up to 37.5 hours. Work will involve activities that enhance Farm Bureau member engagement in public policy and understanding how policy will impact Indiana agriculture.

In particular, this internship will include grassroots programming associated with the 2022 legislative session and policy analysis. The intern will work at the INFB corporate offices in Indianapolis and at the State Capitol. The internship begins January 8, 2022 and work through the end of the 2022 spring semester.

Strong written and oral communication skills and organizational skills are required. Applicant should be self-motivated; detail oriented and exhibit strong interest in public policy issues. A working knowledge of Microsoft Office is required.

An agricultural background is preferred but not required. The pay rate is \$14/hr. from Indiana Farm Bureau and applicant will also receive a \$4,000 living allowance from the Purdue College of Agriculture.

Any college student in their junior or senior year is encouraged to apply.
