As you all know, data collection for the June surveys took place during a period of great uncertainty, with weather related planting delays and final planting dates approaching. This was acknowledged during the Secretary's briefing for the June Acreage report. Nationally, 16.7 percent of corn and 41.2 percent of soybeans remained to be planted at the point where all data were collected. Indiana, Michigan and Ohio will be among several other states to conduct June re-interviews. Details on the data collection plan are forthcoming, and we will be sharing those with you as soon as possible.

Telephone Interviews

Have you ever been trying to reach a farm operator by phone at all hours of the day, and no one answers? If this is the case, the phone number may be wrong. Try searching the internet for a better phone number for the farm name, operator's name or partner's name. The regional field office or your NASDA Coordinator may also have access to search tools to assist you in finding a better number.

When completing a survey on the iPad, please be sure to put the better phone number into the CAPI system either as a comment or, better yet, an address update. All too often, research is completed to find better numbers only for them to never get updated in the system, which causes us to start from scratch the next time we try to contact that operator.

When completing a paper questionnaire, if the telephone number on the label is correct, it's not necessary to copy the good number to the back page. If you do, we need to compare it to the number on the label and if you transpose a digit, we need to figure out which one is correct.

Friday Feedback for June 7, 2019

June Area - Miyares

It's Friday and we are in the thick of it for June Area.... We know you are too! Thank you for all your hard work on the survey as well as time spent on Crops APS and June Hogs. As of Friday afternoon, we have received 45% of completed segments and 41% of known Ag Tract Questionnaires in the office.

REMEMBER Monday is the last day to ship UPS. *Please* make sure you use a **Next Day Air** UPS shipping label and keep track of your UPS Tracking codes.

Also, as you finish up with that one last Segment... Tract... Edit... please keep the following things in mind:

- Always include the preprinted screener with a bar code when mailing in segments. Not having the bar code slows down the check-in process.
- If you used a Section D Supplement, DO NOT tape, staple or clip the form to the tract questionnaire. Be sure the segment number, and tract letter are on the form and insert in the tract questionnaire.
- If a farmer is operating multiple tracts in a segment, one tract letter should be used for everything he's operating. DO NOT GIVE EACH TRACT A SEPARATE LETTER!!!
- If a phone number is printed on a label, it is not necessary to copy it over in the phone cell on the back page.
- If the primary operator has changed, even if it is the same operation name, we need to use a different tract letter and the data needs to be put on a blank questionnaire. The pre-printed bar code one should be then returned to East Lansing with an X through the front page explaining the nature of the change. Do NOT put a new operator's data on a bar coded questionnaire that has someone else's name on it.
